Checking in...

This week I lost the use of my cell phone for two days. In doing an update, I made the mistake of not plugging in my phone – and so it ran out of power and froze up. Because of some other issues, I was unable to "unfreeze" it until I went to the Apple Store – which they fixed within an hour!

As you can imagine, not having a phone meant that my daily work and interactions changed. I didn't panic, but became very frustrated. It also gave me a look into my life with a cellphone. My first worry was not having access to family and emergency services. We no longer have a land line and so there was no consistent back up. I realized that having my cellphone means I can call 911 immediately. I haven't had to – but knowing that there is this safety net helps me to not worry.

Without my phone, I had to carefully work out when I would take my husband's phone – so he wasn't left without access. Our conversations about access wasn't the quick – "do you have your phone" but rather if you need to reach me, call this person who will be nearby me or I will be at this place so you can drive over to find me. It took more planning on our part. Do you remember how you had to leave a phone number so your parents would know who to call? Or having cash so you could call from a phone booth? (a phone booth – what is that?)



I was pleased with myself that I didn't miss the games or news that I constantly use — I didn't miss Facebook or other social media. I knew that once I got my phone back I would catch up. A break from the constant media bombardment meant I talked to my husband more — read more — and played actual Scrabble (not Words with Friends).

However, what I missed the most was the texting that kept me connected to my family and friends. Texting provides me a quick check on how people are doing – or what their plans are – or messages about what is going on. Texting saves time and keeps me in constant communication with the people who mean the most to me. Without my phone, I couldn't find out if my son got home okay, or who was coming to dinner, or how was Grandma Ginny feeling. A friend's father died and it took a couple of hours before we knew because we didn't get the text. Those quick little messages that keep me up to date with other people's lives also gives me peace of mind. In the days of land lines, I had to have the time to call, to be in a place where the phone was located – and the person had to be on the other end to pick up the phone. Catching up took hours rather than seconds – and often we missed important things because we weren't near a phone. It was what it was – but now not being immediately connected is very frustrating – and worrisome.

Cellphones can be a pain and have changed our daily lives. We have obviously embraced the use of cellphones – you can see it everywhere: people with their heads down looking at their phones in every situation. We have lost some important interactions because of our cellphones – face to face conversations, meeting strangers while waiting in line, staying focused to our kids or our parents. But we also now have ways that keep us connected to each other.

On reflection about not having my cellphone, I was reminded again how important it is to me to be connected with those I love. I hope that you don't have to lose your phone usage to reach out to that friend, family or acquaintance who could use a quick text that says, "just checking in."





God, Process, and Politics

Karen Bray & Hollis Phelps

Western thought and political actions once rested on a three-tiered universe: a powerful God above, humans on earth, and spirits in the underworld. That universe has been replaced with relativity, string theory, and quantum leaps. We need new language about God that is consistent with our universe. With an emphasis on science, on a deity of limited power, and on an unfolding universe, process theology can change our language about God and the way we understand God and politics.



Karen Bray (Ph.D., Drew University) is an Assistant Professor of Religion and Philosophy at Wesleyan College and a candidate for Unitarian Universalist minister. She is interested in how secular institutions and cultures behave theologically. Her work has been published in various academic journals.



Hollis Phelps (Ph.D., Claremont Graduate University) is Assistant Professor of Interdisciplinary Studies at Mercer University. He is the author of Alain Badion: Between Theology and Anti-Theology and co-editor of Beyond Superlatives: Regenerating Whitehead's Philosophy of Experience and Religion and European Philosophy.
