Sunday, December 3 "God's Promises...to Adam and Eve"

Wednesday, December 6 "God's Promises...to Jacob"





Not to worry though, I didn't come away from this experience with deep emotional scars. I soon forgave my father. But what I did learn was a lifelong lesson in integrity. Do what you say you're going to do.

How wonderful it would be if each of us could be more like God in being true to our word. But let's also remember when we do fail, we can ask forgiveness.

Father, we thank You for the faithfulness of Your word. We realize that it is the sure foundation of all things. We ask Your help to enable us to only speak that which we are able to accomplish and forgive us when we don't. Amen.

Friday, December 8 "God's Promises...to the Israelites"



In today's Bible reading God gave Israel all the land that He promised them, and they took possession of it. Not a one of their enemies withstood them. God gave His people a victorious life. God kept His promises.

In 1816, Tom's third great-grand parents were led by God to emigrate from Germany to America. During the crossing it was learned that the ship was bound for South America in order to sell the passengers as slaves. They mutinied and turned the ship north landing in Newfoundland. In Quebec, the captain was tried, found guilty and imprisoned.

Crossing the St. Lawrence River with wagons pulled by oxen, they headed southwest ending up in what is now Rochester. They were the second German family to settle in the area.

After a while they acquired land and became the first truck-farmers in Western New York taking their produce into the city to sell. Because of their great faith, the mother and son walked to Albany then on to New York City to have their baby baptized. There was no minister in this area at that time. Eventually they became prosperous and funded the first German church in Rochester.

In writing to his daughter, a grandson said, "There is an inheritance I leave you which is far more precious than earthly possessions---namely, faith in God. May you persevere in it. Embrace tribulations God has destined you, knowing Jesus will give you the necessary help to carry on."

The Israelites were brought out of slavery in Egypt to God's promised land. Our ancestors were brought through trials into a land where they could thrive. The Lord will be faithful to us fulfilling all His promises. He will be with us in all circumstances with His peace and love as He promises in His word.

Lord God, help us to continue to believe in Your promises knowing that one day we will enter that promised land. Amen.

Saturday, December 9 "God Promises...to Gideon"



God's call to Gideon in Judges 6 is another example of how He is no respecter of persons (Acts 10:34). I know that I can rely on God's promise to be with me as I tell others about His love for mankind and the way He has provided eternal life. God's Spirit within me assures me of His promise to be with me and emboldens me as I seek to do His will.

Like Naomi, God may not remove us from our circumstances, but He is there with us during our struggles. He's already redeemed us on the cross. The final word in the book links Ruth to her great-grandson, David...and a thousand years later to our Messiah, Redeemer, and Friend.
