Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

Something I truly appreciate about the liturgical calendar is the way in which it holds time for us to experience a vast range of emotions. We move from an expectant state of being in the season of Advent, to one of joyful celebration in Christmastime, to one of increasing amazement as more and more of the person of Christ is revealed to us. And now in Lent through Easter, by way of the story of Jesus, we'll wander through confusion and vulnerability, loss and grief, peace and liberation--and everything in between.



Of course, our emotions don't necessarily follow the timeline of the liturgical calendar. We might experience deep sorrow during Christmas and great joy during Lent. But the liturgical calendar is, I think, honest about the human experience. What I mean by that is it acknowledges how we cycle through feelings. We're not always happy, for example, and I think the rhythm of the liturgical calendar illustrates that--Scripture does as well. This is important in a day and an age where in so many ways we're told to "get over _____" and "move on".

In contrast, our Christian faith speaks to the fullness of human experience--the good, the bad, and the ugly. Moreso, our Christian faith knows the reality of sin, suffering, and death. Lent, in particular, invites us not to "move on" from sin, suffering, and death. Rather, Lent invites us to turn toward God and "move through" them, trusting in the way of Jesus and in the promise of Easter that life will come through death.

These forty days of Lent offer an opportunity for self-examination and reflection. An opportunity to be honest about ourselves and life on earth. All is not perfect. We are not perfect. Indeed, the world is messy and complicated and broken. But Lent will move us toward the cross, where through Christ's very broken body we receive restoration. It's a beautiful paradox...

I invite you to journey with us this Lent at Hope, not only through our regular Sunday services and Holy Week services, but also in our Midweek Lenten offerings. On Wednesdays, we'll share in fellowship at soup and bread dinners beginning at 5:30 p.m. followed by a time of worship with Holden Evening Prayer at 6:30 p.m. Additionally, we will enter into conversations and prayer at Holy Rosary on Sunday evenings in a joint effort commemorating the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation.

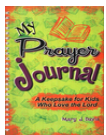

Last month we invited friends to worship with us on a specially designated Sunday. Now What? Will we leave them to attend on their own, if they wish? What about inviting – and accompanying them – to an activity at the church like choir, breakfast/brunch after worship, Adult Forum, Dine Around, Soup Supper, Lenten Worship etc.? Sit with them during worship and introduce them to others. These are ways we can show our friends we really care about them and continue our welcoming journey.

If we lived in a small town and attended a church with a small attendance, we would know each other, see each other frequently around town, be aware of each other's joys and problems. It is not so simple in a city Bozeman's size or larger. We have to be more intentional as we welcome and invite people to church or other activities.

Those new to the area are usually cautious regarding new situations. "Will I know anyone?" "Will I be accepted?" are two worries. We can ease their concerns by being more inclusive. Offer to pick them up for an event, introduce them to others, learn something more about them so you can help them make connections with those of similar interests.

Welcoming and Inviting aren't just for those who are new to Hope. We have many members who live alone and may feel isolated from the community. The December 2016/January 2017 issue of *AARP The Magazine* has a good article about isolation. It states that "prolonged isolation and loneliness erode well-being – equivalent to smoking 15 cigarettes a day." Do we know anyone in this situation?

Rob Moss, pastor of Lutheran Church of the Master in Lakewood, CO, writes in the October issue of *Living Lutheran*, "Welcoming, from a missional perspective, is passive. It denotes waiting for visitors and guests to drop by. Inviting is different. Inviting is active. Being an inviting church means that we leave the comfort of Sunday morning worship and seek out our neighbors. Being an inviting church starts with who God has called us to be as a church and mandates joining God at work in the world."

So, check in with those you invited to attend with you on Bring a Friend Sunday. Invite them again, find out if they are interested in any of our activities and invite them to attend with you. Use your imagination for how you can be "inviting and including."

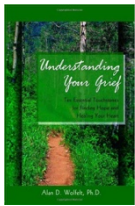

Food and beverages will be provided when the doors open at 4 pm and guests will be immediately welcome to start bidding on silent auction items and examining live auction items. Live auction will begin at 5:30.

We are inviting many supporters to donate items for both live and silent auction: Quilting Groups in your congregations, other quilt artists, youth groups, and any others who are interested. Along with the wonderful quilts, there will be things like tickets to special sporting events, vacation get-aways, hand crafted items, baskets filled with items that fit a theme, professional services and art work.

In the summer of 2016, Christikon served 130 Montana youth. SYNOD HOUSE BUILD

How would you like to spend a week this summer working on a construction site? Not really? Hmmmm. Well this is a kind of special construction site. You will work with folks you know; as well as ones you meet from congregations around the state. This will be a great time

to give a little sweat equity to your church. Our Synod is constructing a new small office building in Great Falls to house the synod staff. This project has been 8 years in the making and the Bishop/Council felt that this summer is the time. ELCA Mission Builders (<https://www.elca.org/Our-Work/Related-Ministries/Mission-Builders>) has been retained to build the building. Part of their process is to use volunteers in much of their work, translating into a substantial savings to the synod. The synod is asking congregations to send work crews during the summer to help Mission Builders complete the building. The minimum size of the crew is 6 individuals (4 crew plus 2 cooks). No construction experience is necessary, but you need to enjoy working in that environment. Crews will serve for one week (Tuesday – Saturday) starting June 6 and ending in Early September. It is my hope that we can put together a work crew from Hope. That means we have to find a week that fits the crew member schedules and is a date not already filled. The sooner we get our date submitted the better. There is a sign-up sheet on the bulletin board across from the coat racks. You may also contact me (ddeschamps@montanadsl.net) or by phone/text at 580-9906, if you are interested. If you sign up, you are not obligating yourself. All this says is that you are interested. I will have a meeting with all interested parties and we will see if we can come up with a mutually acceptable date to submit. Thank you for your interest in this important and FUN opportunity.
