

MENSTRUAL JUSTICE, THOMAS MERTON, GUARANTEED INCOME, & SURVIVING THE ANDREA DORIA

November 5: Tomi-Ann Roberts

BLEEDING IN JAIL: OBJECTIFICATION AND THE FIGHT FOR MENSTRUAL JUSTICE

Tomi-Ann will discuss her involvement as an expert for a class action lawsuit on behalf of jailed women subjected, en masse, to degrading strip and body cavity searches in which those who are menstruating must remove soiled feminine hygiene products and, in many cases, bleed in front of one another and the deputies. She will explore the issues raised around the problematic emotions of shame and disgust that ensue when we repudiate our own or others' biological bodies. She will discuss some exciting ways that evidence-based advocacy can serve the cause of menstrual justice. Dr. Roberts, a popular Forum speaker, is a professor of Psychology at Colorado College and has focused on the social psychology of emotion, gender, and the body; psychological consequences of the sexual objectification of women and girls; philosophy of emotions; psychological components of women's reproductive health; positive psychology of mirth, enjoyment, awe and wonder.

NOVEMBER 12: ERIK HANSON

Thomas Merton and the relevancy of contemplation in today's world

Dr. Hanson, Senior Instructor in the Department of Philosophy at UCCS, will speak to us about Thomas Merton, the renowned twentieth century theologian and Trappist monk. He will discuss the relevancy of Merton's contemplative virtues and how they might assist us in navigating through our current cultural climate of "social media, social distrust, social unrest, and social breakdown." Dr. Hanson holds academic degrees from the University of Boulder, University of Bristol, King's College London, and Purdue University. He specializes in the Philosophy of Religion.

November 19: Daphne Greenwood

Work and pay in a sustainable economy

How does a sustainable economy relate to environmental and social sustainability? What has changed about work and pay to shrink the middle class and upward mobility? What roles have education urban development, and health care played? ... formal and informal policies about race? ...gender equality? ...immigration? How can technological change and globalization contribute positively without causing more insecurity? Should the response to automation be a universal basic income? How does that stack up against "employer of last resort" and the EU's "flexicurity" initiative? **Daphne Greenwood** is Professor of Economics and directs the Colorado Center for Policy Studies at UCCS. She has been a member of FCUCC since 2004 and is a former state legislator.

November 26: Ardith Hanson

"Well! Wasn't that a great adventure?" - Surviving the sinking of the Andrea Doria

On the night of July 25, 1956, **Ardith Hanson**, along with two brothers and her very pregnant mother were steaming towards NYC. In a thick fog, the *SS Stockholm* plowed into the side of their ship, the *SS Andrea Doria*. She will tell her memories of that night, bring some mementos, and briefly describe her trauma treatment with EMDR decades later. Ardith retired in 2010 from a career in Blood Banking and Clinical Laboratory Technology; since then, she spent four years assembling *The Communicator* and several years on the JWW Committee and the Health Ministry. She is now co-chair of The Forum.

THE 106TH TRADITIONAL MYSTERY PAGEANT

Our Christmas Mystery takes its name from the mystery plays or dramas that began in the early 10th Century and flourished well into the 1400s in western Europe. Our musical-drama is a Christmas Pageant combining the biblical accounts of the birth of Jesus along with church legends and beloved Christmas carols. It is performed each Advent season on the Sunday before Christmas.

One unknown in The Mystery is "Who will be Mary and Joseph?" We have a lovely tradition of secrecy surrounding these two people each year--the Mystery Members tapping persons in our faith community who have contributed outstanding service.

The ceramic figure of the "Bambino" (Christ Child) and the censer carried by a Wise Man were acquired in Italy by Dr. Alfred A. Blackman's Family around 1900 and lent to the church for use in the play by the Haney family. In 2009, the Haney family gifted the family heirlooms to First Congregational Church. The cruse for myrrh is like those from biblical times. In 2010, the Mystery Committee had the "Bambino" repaired and restored to its original integrity. In the drama the Angel Choir is composed of high school and college-age youth, and the Seraph's (lead angel's) part is sung by one of the church's excellent female vocalists. The Shepherds' roles are taken by male singers of the church, and the Wise

Men solo parts carried by baritone voices. During the pageant, cherub-children of the congregation come forward and present a gift of song before the manger. A cookie and wassail gathering follows in the Founders' Room.

We hope "The Mystery" opens you to the Deepest Mystery this season!


WELCOME NEW MEMBERS!

A PEEK IN THE PAST: FREE SPEECH



Among the documents I received from the archive of Lenore Poulson, our earlier historian who recently passed away, was a program of the celebrations in 1949 on the occasion of the church's 75th anniversary. The program stretched over eight days, including services on October 23 and 30, a seminar on "Free and Non-conformist Churches," and a lecture on "Faith and Freedom in American Higher Education" by previous pastor Rev. D. D. Williams - all evidence of a newly vibrant church. The anniversary committee alone consisted of 27 members. The guide of FCC into the post-war

era and renewal had been Thomas Dick, Jr.

Thomas C. Dick, Jr. was born in 1911 in Elizabeth, New Jersey. He went to Tusculum College in Greene, Tennessee where he met and married his wife Katrina. They moved to Chicago where Tom studied at the Theological Seminary and received his B.D. on the thesis "Man's Confrontation of Death." Ordained in 1939, he served from 1940 as the pastor of Plymouth Congregational Church in St. Paul, Minnesota where he also was the director and secretary of the Minnesota Congregational Conference.

In 1944 the call from FCC came, and Tom and Katrina with twoyear-old twins Jim and Jeanette moved to Colorado Springs. There their younger children Elinor (1946) and Robert (1949) were born. In the ten years of Rev. Dick's pastorate, the church's membership grew from its 374 low to over 650. The Parish House was remodeled (The basement rooms addition under the Founders' Room) and a full choir was established under the direction of a minister of music, Mrs. Jessie Newgeon Hawkes. Among many public functions, Tom Dick

co-founded the Unity Council, resided over Christmas Unlimited, and was moderator of the Colorado Congregational Conference. Katrina worked with the YMCA and the League of Women Voters. Both were active in the PTA.

In a 1953 PTA meeting Rev. Dick spoke up in defense of the local ACLU and what was deemed to be "the teaching of socialist ideologies." In the McCarthy era and conservative Colorado Springs this was anathema. In letters to the editor of The Gazette, to the church and to him personally, he was accused of Communist sympathies. An FBI inquiry followed and Pastor Dick escaped indictment only

because he was "a clergyman ... with a wife and four children." Colorado Springs had If you you know:

Tom Dick's next pastorate was First Plymouth Congregational in Lincoln, Nebraska, one of the largest Congregational Churches in the country, where he stood for five years, after which he moved on to Washington, DC and later California. He died in Fremont, California in 1985 as the result of a car accident and was buried in Alameda.



IGNITE PROGAM BEGINS AT LA FORET

Our 21st century world is descending into aggression, fear and separation. War, genocide, violence, slavery, pandemics, poverty, natural disasters--all these are common place in this new century, despite most people's longing to live together in peace. - Margaret Wheatley*

I would have to add all the "isms" (our "prisms"): racism, sexism, ageism, liberalism and conservatism, homophobism, ableism,.... It is sad and true that these are "commonplace." They exist in the outer world, in churches and families, and within.

What will we do? What role do we play individually, in the communities in which we live, in our families, with our friends, and as a church? How will—and how must—some things change? How will—and must—I change who I am, how I know myself, how I speak, and what I do?

These realities and these questions are what IGNITE is all about.

For more than five years, seven visionary leaders have dreamt and created a Leadership Initiative within the Rocky Mountain Conference. In October, the pilot program began with a week-long retreat at La Foret. For nine months participants will have regular, chosen, deliberate connection through checkins, meetings, cohort gatherings, shared resources, and fun. In April, we will again spend a week at La Foret. Twenty-seven clergy and lay leaders from around the Rocky Mountain Conference feel called and determined, purposeful in learning what God is doing, and how to respond. We are studying and practicing several methodologies and fields of





thought about collaborative and participatory leadership. Much of what underlies the approach is based on a body of work called "The Art of Hosting and Convening Conversations that Matter." It is about shared leadership and shared wisdom. It is about the notion that God is at work in all, in new ways, and we need every voice to understand, listen, and continue to serve and love well in troubled times. It is also an approach deeply rooted in practice (not just words) and retreat (change the person, change the world).

Truly this is a bold and daring step for the Conference to be dreaming, financing, creating in order to allow the Spirit of the future to emerge. The answers are not known yet. It takes courage. It takes practice. It takes curiosity, non-judgment, honest conversation.

But/And God is still speaking. If we listen, and listen well, we will all emerge with Her.

Please keep us all in prayer and please ask questions. I hope to share the ongoing process, share resources, methods and more. You KNOW where to find me on Sundays!!


