AFTER EASTER

It is "after Easter."

During the last few weeks I have uttered these words many times. Anything that needed my attention but was not urgent got listed under tasks to do "after Easter."

And now that it is after Easter, I realize that I need a break. Hence, I am considering not writing this article....

However, I suspect, that I am not alone in this experience and that many of us feel overwhelmed by life's demands as we continue to keep the rapid pace, to catch up with life while trying to remain mentally sane, spiritually centered and creatively productive.

Research suggests that our human brains are at their most innovative when they are resting, even daydreaming. They suggest that silence and quiet, relaxation and rest render us more innovative. It seems daydreaming is how we access our big-picture state of mind, when we make connections and gain new perspective.

It seems our brain has two separate attention systems, says Daniel Willingham, Professor of Psychology at the University of Virginia — an external one and an internal one. The internal attention system, which is activated during daydreaming, is called the default network.

"This default network is particularly active when you are thinking about yourself, thinking about the past, thinking about the future," Willingham says. "You can't really have both [attention systems] active at the same time, but they're in some ways linked."

If both systems can't be active at the same time and we're spending ten hours a day in one attention system, it begs the question: what is that doing to our brains — and our ability to come up with creative ideas?

Is this why our world is such a mess?

So why don't we make time for rest and reflection, for daydreaming and relaxation? Why do we fill our "free" moments with our smartphones, other devices or just noise? Why don't we make time to let our minds wonder and wander, imagine and dream? I don't know. But I am going to embrace daydreaming and silence during these fifty days of Easter while I take time to rest and while I walk for exercise. This is intentional rest time, intentional silence similar to centering prayer, and intentional daydreaming. And, I am beginning right now, the day "after Easter!" If you want to join me on this venture let me know.

family faith formation in the zist century

Thank you to the congregation for supporting me to attend a symposium on Family Faith Formation in March that was held at the Franciscan Renewal Center in Scottsdale,

Arizona. John Roberto, one of the authors of *Of Families at the Center of Faith Formation*, commenced with some new questions.

- What does a vibrant and vital family faith look like in the 21st century, especially when the culture places so many more demands, distractions, and scheduling on family life?
- How do we meaningfully engage/connect with today's families?
- How do we empower/equip/resource families to transmit faith at home as we can only provide support for an hour or two on a Sunday morning, and the home is surely the center of evolving a vibrant faith? Each generation evolves differently, and many may not trust that they have the spiritual tools and understanding to convey to their kids if they themselves did not have a healthy, rigorous religious upbringing.

 How do we reach families who are not involved in a faith community, feeling religion is not important or that culturally membership/registrations have different meanings compared to the era of their grandparents?

The symposium continued to deepen into these questions acknowledging that every context of community has different permutations to deal with. Most of the attendees were in fact from Catholic dioceses, and they felt First Congo was way ahead of the curve. In many ways, our Palm Sunday was a reflection of an ideal Faith Formation experience - a personalized and well advertised event; opportunities for families to have fun and learn together with other young families; integration of learning into the whole flow of the day; follow up at home for Holy Week. Encouraging parents to share serving communion together with their children is another opportunity to deepen into the rituals and develop bonds with the Faith Community.

Nonetheless the symposium reminded me that we also need to

- be more intentional in HOW we present meaningful opportunities as belonging to whole church-based initiatives and not as side-kick events
- make it as easy as possible for families to receive information to participate, using technology in new, effective, and creative ways
- create and reinforce more links between what we share on a Sunday or at an event and help transfer follow-up in homes that is simple to undertake
- develop more ways to honor Milestone events in family lives, linking their own human story to the biblical and spirit filled journey
- honor the challenges of today's family lives and work out how to place them more in the center of things rather than expect them to step in to the old structures of church life.

Food for thought? YES, we are needing to set the table together for the church of the 21st century!





of the atonement and their implications. Then we will look at a nonviolent alternative that provides a different vision. Maybe God is not angry at us after all.



roles. It's amazing what Dave Seyfert started thirty-five years ago! As I finish my sixth year as the Forum Lead, I can easily recall the joys of doing this work for our church. I will never forget entering the Chapel on Sunday mornings seeing the smiling faces in the audience. The Forum Team (Don Allred, Bruce Latimer, Cathy White, and Leah Davis Witherow) seem to always get the best speakers! Don't be surprised if you see me in the audience on Sunday mornings at the Forum next fall.

Each Sunday morning at 9:45 a.m. the Forum meets for an hour in the Carey Chapel to listen to members of our own congregation as well as selected outside speakers. The Forum satisfies both the soul and the intellect. We have two speakers lined up to end the Spring Forum Season:

May 7: Sean Buchanan - Christianity, the Absurd, and Pyrotheology: A Peter Rollins 101 [JWW Lecture Prep]

This interactive discussion will focus on concepts covered in books by Peter Rollins, our JWW guest lecturer this year. Peter Rollins describes a faith that is active, living, dynamic and engaged in the world. For him, faith is not a set of beliefs but a loving embrace of the world in which we live. It is not a dogma but the practice of love and compassion. Rollins embraces a "religion-less" interpretation of Christianity called Pyrotheology which views faith as a particular way of engaging with the world rather than a set of beliefs about the world. Sean and his family are relatively new to First Congo, but as a family of seven they are hard to miss. Sean has a psychology degree and spent many years in the banking industry. For the past seven years he's been involved in church consulting, and he now is the chief strategist for a mobile app company that serves churches. He has been a stewardship director, college pastor, and elder at a former church. His interests include poker, mountain biking, and fine bourbon. He is also going to be a Forum Co-Leader starting in late May.

May 14: No Forum - JWW Lectureship Series with Peter Rollins (May 12-14)

May 21: Speaker TBA - What is a Sanctuary Church?

In the wake of President Trump's recent executive orders tightening immigration, there is increased interest amongst caring people in the idea of Sanctuary churches. The current church sanctuary movement in the U.S. began to take shape about ten years ago, inspired by a 1980s effort to provide shelter to immigrants fleeing civil war and gangs in Central America. Houses of worship where undocumented people can go who fear deportation are called sanctuaries. Even those who wish to see a more stringent enforcement of our southern border are often concerned with the lack of compassion for those people at risk of deportation who have been living in the US for a number of years. According to leaders of the loosely-knit sanctuary movement, about 800 US churches and other houses of worship that have declared themselves sanctuaries for undocumented immigrants. Come to the Forum to listen and participate in a discussion about this topic and how FCC might play a collaborative role in the future.

September 10: The Forum resumes next fall.

Head ushers make gift plans for the future of fcc

On a recent fine spring morning, I had the opportunity to sit down with Virginia Carlson and David Doman to talk about their decision to include the church in their future gift plans.

Ruth: You joined the church in April 1997, twenty years ago. Why?

Virginia: I was first attracted by the beauty of the building; I just wanted to see inside! Then I heard **Jim White** preach, and I was sold.



Dave: I saw Jim on a Bill Moyers TV segment about the time we realized that we needed to stand up for what we believed in, post Amendment 2. We started attending but weren't members. I remember a sermon of Jim's that was very emotional. He shared that some members were leaving because of the Open & Affirming issue, but he still believed that moving forward on this social justice issue was the right thing for the church to do. After the service, I told Jim that some might leave, but others would join. Jim looked right at me and asked, "Will you be the first new member?" What could I say but yes!

Ruth: You serve as the Head Ushers for worship services. How else have you engaged with the church?

Virginia: I first got involved in the church by helping with the labyrinth and Taizé services.

Dave: Scotty (their son) and I helped put up and take down the labyrinth.

Virginia: Then I helped with **Jim White'**s retirement celebration. Soon after, I served on Church Council and became involved in the Project Management Team that oversaw the historic restoration projects. This was perfect for me because I've bought, renovated, and sold old Victorians for years.

Dave: My first activity was the church softball team. **Linn Gustafson** was the pitcher, **Paul McNeill** was first baseman, and I was catcher. Because I'd been a first baseman most of my softball career, I could dig out any ball that got thrown over home plate. Later, **Tom Ryan** was responsible for recruiting me to usher about once a month. When **Oscar Ridings** retired as Head Usher, Virginia and I agreed to share the duties.

Ruth: You have named the church as a beneficiary in your trust agreement. Why did you decide to do this?

Virginia: This church is such a spiritual support to me. There have been times that I would have been on the floor if I wouldn't have had this community. This is an acknowledgement of what is in our hearts.

Dave (*tearing up*): I'm going to give the Prayer Shawl Ministry a plug. When I was having problems with my back and we thought it might be cancer, the prayer shawl I received was such a comfort. Also, the visits from the ministers were a blessing.

Virginia: I have been doing prison outreach for about eight years; I started with someone I knew and it has grown from there. Even though I was scared, I started because the church's spiritual support and the song "What Does the Lord Require of Me?" gave me the courage to try.

Ruth: Was the process of making this gift difficult or expensive?

Virginia: No, it was easy. We had created documents earlier, and we just did an amendment. I have a question though: are we able to designate how we want the bequest to be used?

Ruth: Absolutely. I'll send you a form to help with that.

Dave: Yeah, we want the bequest to be "underwear money." You know, for the fabric of the church.

Virginia and Ruth: Loud groans.

A peek in the past: The care of souls

Daniel Day Williams was born in 1910 in Denver, Colorado to a conservative Methodist family. His father, a lawyer and prolific writer, wrote a biography of William Jennings Bryan, the three times Democratic presidential candidate and anti-Darwinist. Daniel went on from Denver University to the University of Chicago, where he obtained his MA in 1933 and BD at the Theological Seminary in 1934. Already during his early student years, he had become very uncomfortable with the traditional Methodist views of his parents. The introductions at the seminary to neo-orthodoxy and the process philosophy of Alfred North Whitehead opened up new perspectives for him. He went on to Columbia University in New York, where a year later he married Eulalia Westberg, whom he had met in Chicago.

It is unclear what prompted him to interrupt his studies and seek the ministry. Perhaps it was a combination of a desire to apply

his new-found faith and financial needs, but, at not quite 28 years old, he accepted the call from First Congregational Church of Colorado Springs. There he landed with a congregation that was at the low point in its history. Membership was at two thirds of its ten years earlier maximum, and the two previous pastors had departed under clouds. The young pastor lasted exactly two years in the trenches. The precipitous slide in attendance actually was halted, but he must have become very discouraged. For a year he took the position of Dean at Shove Chapel with Colorado College, and in 1939 the couple moved back to Chicago Theological Seminary, where Rev. Williams joined the staff. He obtained his PhD from Columbia in 1940, and from 1955 was Professor of Systematic Theology at Union Theological Seminary in New York until his death in 1973.


Dr. Daniel Day Williams was one of the prominent theologians of the process theology school. Whitehead, its effective founder, had described God as the Great Companion, the understanding fellow sufferer, who evolved with mankind. The process theologians built upon that and in one of his many works Prof. Williams explained: "What I try to present in this book is a perspective on the meaning of the love of God and the loves of men... A revolution has taken place in our view of the world. The concepts of evolution, development, growth, and becoming have become indispensable terms for conceiving what things are. Process theologians believe that this revolution in our world view must be incorporated in Christian doctrine and that it brings us closer to the biblical view of the creative and redemptive working of God than theology has been since the first century.' One wonders what would have happened if FCC had been less of a challenge.


The four sessions will be based on, but not limited to, the following:

Session 3, July 17: Practicing Peace.



The Rev. Kenneth J. Hauck founded the Stephen Ministry program in 1975 while he was a church pastor in St. Louis. He said he "couldn't do it all." So **STEPHEN** with a background as a clinical **MINISTRY**



psychologist, he enlisted and trained a handful of lay people to offer confidential care and support to their fellow parishioners.

Since then, more than 10,000 congregations around the world in some 150 dominations have become Stephen Ministry churches. Ours is one such congregation, having been a Stephen Ministry church for 10 years!

The **Rev. Dr. Jacque Franklin**, Minister of Pastoral Care, heads up FCC's program.

Here's why Rev. Hauck said he began the program: "Christianity is not a spectator sport. It was never intended to be. God gave to the church apostles, evangelists, and pastors and teachers whose job is to equip the saints for ministry. When a person allows you into their life and shares their feelings and their hurts with you, they are giving you a fantastic gift,' Hauck said. "When you listen to them and when you accept their feelings and when you love them, share Christ's love with them, you are giving them a similarly powerful gift."

And here's what a care receiver and a Stephen Minister have to say:

"I think I recognize God in my life a lot more than I had in the past, and a lot of it is because of Stephen Ministry."

"My journey [as a Stephen Minister] becomes more profound as each day, week and month pass by. I learned early on that I was called to care for others, but for years I had no idea what a blessing that calling is."
