
20th Sunday of Pentecost, October 22 – Historical Sunday



THE FORUM IN OCTOBER

Each Sunday morning from 9:45-10:45 a.m., The Forum meets in the Carey Chapel (located off of the Founders' Room, opposite the Kitchen). For more than 35 years, The Forum has invited speakers on a variety of topics that may be sacred or secular but are always interesting and often challenging.

October 1: Steve Kern - The Ethics of Driverless Cars: Would You Get Behind the Wheel of a Car that might choose to Kill You?

Steve Kern and his wife Nancy Henjum have been active members of FCC for decades. Steve has served as *The Communicator* editor, Worship Council director, and chair of the church board. He recently retired from decades at Palmer High School, where he taught English and "Theory of Knowledge" as well as directed the International Baccalaureate program. Over the years, Steve has presented at Forum on the search for the historical Jesus and current insights into moral intuition in emerging fields such as evolutionary psychology and cognitive neuroscience. In this session, he will discuss the programming of driverless cars. Software engineers today confront the unavoidable task of writing code that must digitize human morality. Consider as we will during this session whether driverless cars should be programmed with the option of sacrificing the driver to save a pedestrian. Join Steve for a presentation and discussion about the practical and philosophical implications of designing our cars to make life-and-death decisions without us.

OCTOBER 8: MIKE HALBY - BEE COLONY COLLAPSE

Mike Halby, Pikes Peak Beekeepers Association Secretary, is a retired Army helicopter pilot who developed an interest in hobby beekeeping about 18 years ago. Mike has lived in Colorado Springs over 22 years (this time) and also enjoys golf, woodworking, history, and movies. His wife Sandy spoke to us about bees in January of this year. We welcome Mike back for further discussion of these vitally important insects and the issues facing them, including GMO's, pesticides and colony collapse disorder.

October 22: Chris Steenbergen – Passions of Our Past; the issues that excited early FCC members

Four years ago **Chris Steenbergen** was asked to take the church historian position. He has since then digitized most of the church archives of the past 20 years and transcribed the membership ledgers into a database. Richard was also the Founder and Program Director of the U.S. Environmental Film Festivals in 1990 and 1991, the Conservation Finance Director for the Colorado Trust for Public Land, the Executive Director of the Colorado Environmental Coalition, a Founder and Board Chair of Citizens Project, Co-Director of the Trails, Open Space and Park Initiatives in 1995, 1997 and 2003 and Fundraising Chair for the Stratton Open Space Land Campaign. Join us for an interesting discussion with this devoted public servant!

"BEE... CONNECT... ENGAGE"

Building on the annual theme of BE...CONNECT... ENGAGE, we will explore the parallels between Kids' Community worship and how bees function and make our world sweeter. Bees cannot do it alone. They gather in community (our sanctuary or our hive, for the sake of the metaphor), CONNECT, dance and learn from scripture and each other, then fly out into the world, ENGAGING with flowers and the beauty of nature, transferring pollen from one plant to another and returning to the hive to work together while creating the gift of sweet honey. As an adult reading this, you can continue to make all the parallel metaphors yourself!

The metaphor of the gift boxes also adds a lot of creativity for our Kids' Community. In KC Worship we will adapt our weekly rituals to include the surprise of opening boxes to discover what our collaborative activity will be that week. On Rally Sunday we created a honeycomb collection of colored plexi-glass jigsaw pieces on which we wrote the gift each one of us brings to the Kids' Community and to the whole FCC community. Each week in the fall, we will open a Music Box or a Jack in the Box to discover the Scripture reading for that week. After practicing collaborative and team building activities at church, we will talk about how to take that unifying sweet energy out into the world and ENGAGE God's love with others and God's creation.

Most of all though, we will be practicing how to BE...to gather and sing together in full-bodied expressions at the start of our worship. We then use breath and yoga to deepen into moments of silence and discovery – how to BE closer to God and remind us that God is with us every moment. It is we who need to pause and CONNECT and ENGAGE with God in prayer.

On Rally Sunday in Sunday School classrooms, teachers, kids and parents CONNECTED with a team-building activity. Each class had a unifying theme that burst out of their gift boxes that were displayed in the Atrium. Hopefully you can make the CONNECTION to the gift wrappings. The Preschool/Kindy team, led by **Ty Clarke** and **Aaron Brown**, created leafy branches. 1st Grade OWL, led by **Polly Strovink** and **Brad Mikaelian**, created

I've found that it's a good practice to run those numbers occasionally to make sure that our household budget reflects our deepest values as a family.

I invite you into this process of self-reflection about how you might support our new Lead Minister and beloved church. Would you consider volunteering for a new ministry program? Goodness knows, we couldn't "do church" on Sunday without volunteers! If you've made a financial pledge of \$1,200 for the past 10 years or more, would you increase that by \$20 / month or more? If you've never made a financial covenant with the church, will you make one this year? Will you pray for our new Lead Minister and our church?

I'm sure that you've already thought of other ways to set the table at First Congregational Church. I'd love to hear them. Thanks for all that you do.

With its new Mission Statement, the United Church of Christ is committed to exploring what it takes to build a just world for all by simply loving God and loving our neighbor as we love ourselves.

To help the entire denomination not just speak those good words but live them out in tangible, meaningful ways we have also committed to participating in the *Three Great Loves mission initiative*.

This is, first of all, an invitation to every setting of our denomination to practice love of children, love of neighbor, and love of creation.

Every day across the life of the UCC - in congregations, through our Council for Health and Human Service Ministries agencies, in Conferences, at seminaries and historically related colleges, on army bases and in hospitals where our chaplains serve – love is freely offered and changes lives.



This is not simply a call to action, though. It is also an invitation to share the stories of the impact your love creates. I travel the world and the country witnessing your good works and hearing the testimonies of those whose lives are changed by your love. It is an honor for me to bear witness to, and to hold as a treasure, those good works. This initiative is an opportunity not just to practice love, but to create new ways of hearing across the life of the denomination the powerful stories of impact told by those whose lives and worlds changed because of what you do.

The Three Great Loves mission initiative serves as a way for us all to embody and incarnate a missional commitment to love neighbor and build a just world for all. It will be our concentrated effort to focus our reason for being on the calls to love and justice: two themes consistently raised in the sacred stories we find in our Scriptures and used to describe what is to be found in the heart of God and in the ministry and message of Jesus.

Nothing short of changing the world as a fulfillment of our mission is what we are about here. As your General Minister and President, I have the joy of watching your love in action. You make me very proud.

A PEAK IN THE PAST: NEW LIFE

After two pastor scandals and the early departure of the Rev. Williams in 1938, FCC appeared to be at the low point of its history with less than 400 formal members and quite a few in name only. Williams had managed to stir some interest with the congregation's youth though, so FCC looked for and found another young pastor. Edward Manthei came the following year, straight out of Chicago Theological Seminary, just twenty-five years old. He had done his undergraduate studies

at the University of Wisconsin and was just married to Florence Fallis, who also studied at the Seminary.

Manthei's influence on the recovery of FCC's membership is often underestimated. There's a hidden growth under the apparently static numbers, as during his years many inactive members were removed from the books. Also, the number of confirmands, typically young people, rose. He is one of the few pastors about whom funny anecdotes persist, an indication that he was loved. His absent-mindedness while riding his bicycle, causing a run in with a parked car even made it to The Gazette. At "Ed" Manthei's departure for the FCC of Western Springs, Illinois in 1944, the foundation for the coming growth of the church was firmly established.

Rev. Manthei, a well known amateur actor, would serve several more churches. After sixteen years at Western Springs he came back to Colorado for a seven-year stay at First Plymouth





Congregational of Denver. For four years he served as the President of Chicago Theological Seminary, coming back again to Colorado in 1971 to serve many years at the Broadmoor Community Church. Especially in his later years, Ed Manthei was in demand as a guest preacher at FCC.

He officiated at the Rev. Jim White's installation in 1989.

In a 1970 service, his sermon at FCC was on Deut. 30: 19, "Choose life" in which he reminded the congregation to "Make up your mind to live for and with God." Edward Manthei died in 1998. His ashes are interred in the Broadmoor. Community Church's Columbarium.
