Taking the Next Step is the title for this year's stewardship program for the 2018 ministry support of First Presbyterian Church, Franklin. It is an expression of what we believe should happen when God's people are asked to respond with generous hearts to the ministry opportunities of the church.

In years past, we have prepared a budget and than asked the congregation to subscribe to it. This year, we are changing the order. We are asking the church to respond with estimates of giving and then the Finance Committee will prepare a budget, or spending plan, for those commitments. This approach takes the focus off the need of the church to receive funds and puts it where it rightly should be, the need of the giver to give.

When presented with this plan, the leadership of our church responded enthusiastically, and we hope you will too. It is a change, but we believe it is a healthy change. In fact, it is a natural expansion of what we have done for the past few years, and we plan to continue this approach in the future. For too long, we have been tempted to place too much emphasis on success based on whether we subscribed our budget. Success is better measured when God's people are given a chance to grow and respond in faith to do so. Transformation is the key.

How much do you need to give? That's between you and God. Prayer should be the focus as you seek the answer to this question. There are people in our church that can only grow one or two steps and there are others that can grow much more than that. But don't lose focus. It's not how someone else will respond or what the church needs you to do. The issue is what you need to do in the stewardship of what God has blessed you with — to make an offering that would be pleasing and acceptable to God. It is an exciting time in the life of First Presbyterian Church, Franklin. Will you take the next step with us?

Steps along the Giving Path

First-Time Giver: Begin to give.

Intentional Giver: Plan what percentage of your

income to give for a year.


Growing Giver: Increasing the percentage of income

toward a tithe.

Tither: Begin to give a tithe (10% of income).

Extravagant Giver: Give beyond the tithe, called an

offering (10+% of income).

Greetings to All!

A famous tale of gratitude recounts that of Androcles and a lion. Androcles, a slave who was wondering in the forest, chanced upon an injured lion, which had a huge thorn stuck in it's paw. Androcles helped the lion by removing the thorn and thus gave the lion a second chance at life. Later, Androcles would be captured and thrown into the den of a hungry lion. It rushed toward its fresh prey, but it soon realized that Androcles was the same man who saved his life earlier in the forest. The lion did



not attack, instead, it licked his face like a pet dog and showered the slave with overwhelming affection. This is a simple story of gratitude.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the German theologian, reminds us that in ordinary life we hardly realize that we receive a great deal more than we give, and that it is only with gratitude that life becomes rich.

How easy it is to forget to be grateful. In the crush of life, it is easy to not recall the kindness of a friend, neighbor, or teacher. We might easily overlook the parents, family members, or friends who have contributed ceaselessly throughout our lives. What about the driver who "lets you in"? We might do well to remember that being thankful has other benefits—a thankful heart has little room for arrogance, resentment, jealousy, or anger. Adopting an "attitude of gratitude" can also add life, and health, to your years.

The story of gratitude as found in Aesop's fable about the lion and the slave is a moral lesson where kindness and generosity triumph. Even today, when the world is plagued by natural disasters, it is heartening to read of people rising above them with kindness and generosity. Grace begets grace and as God's people our call is to continue to strive to *become* that which we have received—love, it is a certain outpouring of our gratitude for God's matchless grace.

Now thank we all our God with heart and hands and voices, who wondrous things hath done, in whom this world rejoices; who, from our mother's arms, hath blessed us on our way with countless gifts of love, and still is ours today.

All praise and thanks to God, who reigns in highest heaven, to Father and to Son and Spirit now be given; the one eternal God, whom heaven and earth adore, the God who was, and is, and shall be evermore.

GROWTH GROUPS



SERVICE OF LIGHT



OneGenAway/Food Distribution - 8:00 a.m. Columbia, TN



OneGenAway is dedicated to eliminating racism, denominationalism, and poverty in America, believing that we are one generation away from this vision. OneGenAway raises money to purchase groceries in massive amounts at discounted rates. At each food distribution 18 wheelers drop off the food on pallets and the volunteers separate the quantities of food into grocery bags. When all the food is bagged, volunteers are stationed at different tables. Some volunteers help recipients push grocery carts through a line and pick up each variety of food while going down the line of tables. The volunteer "cart pushers" then assist the recipient to their car to unload the

groceries and often share prayer concerns. The recipients usually end up with about one to two weeks worth of groceries. Recipients must only need food to qualify. This event starts promptly at 8:00 a.m. This distribution will take place at The Boys and Girls Club 209 Wayne Street, Columbia, TN 38401. Parking available on site. Look forward to seeing FPC Volunteers of ALL AGES!

Room In The Inn: Our congregation is one of over 100 churches of varying sizes and denominations that hosts homeless guests during the colder months of the year. November - March FPC hosts 15 guests every Wednesday night by providing meals, showers, a warm bed, and hospitality. Learn about the church wide Room In The Inn program.

What is Room In The Inn?

- 1. A volunteer Bus Driver and a Rider skilled in Guest Relations leaves church at 4:30 p.m. to pick up guests at Nashville Campus for Human Development (if you like to drive~ let FPC help you get your CDL and support this and many other missions!)
- 2. A hearty trio or so gathers around the same time to set up 14 beds and the showers.
- 3. A stalwart group of volunteers prepare 14 sack lunches at their convenience and place them in the church refrigerator after the WNL meal is prepared.
- 4. Guests arrive at 6:00 p.m., find their bed and join us in line for one of Nancy, Margaret and Lucy's delicious meals. Volunteers sack up the small requests (new under garments, combs, etc.) our guests have checked off on their ride to church.
- 5. By 7:45 p.m., 2 well prepared and instructed FPC Volunteer Inn Keepers have arrived and are ready to provide overnight hospitality (bring a book~it is a very quiet night!)
- 6. Showers and Clothes Closet are offered/Lights Out is welcomed by this exhausted group.
- 7. 4:30 a.m. begins the day; coffee is made, breakfast is warmed, guests are stirring & stripping their own beds.
- 8. By 6:00 a.m. 14 rested and well fed Guests are on the bus with sack lunch in hand and headed north.
- 9. By 6:30 a.m., beds are stored, kitchen is cleaned and Inn Keepers begin a unusually fresh day full of potential!

This is NOT a WNL program, it is a FPC whole church mission, it is staffed and supported by SS classes, Youth and Children's groups, Confirmation, Stephen Ministry, Individuals and Families. Our goal this year was by November 1 to have ownership of all the jobs from Nov-March. We are approaching 90% of fulfillment! Much appreciation is extended today to the FPC members who first brought this hands on and immediate mission to us, and to those who have sustained it over the years. Each of these people create a program that thrives as it supplies warm food, shelter and support to our neighbors.

Check in with the Student Leadership Team


