View from the pulpit Senior Pastor Jerry Reynolds



Yellow t-shirts. Never in my life did I own a yellow t-shirt. Then the ELCA began "God's Work. Our Hands." Now I easily have a dozen or more of them. My first thought when I saw them was "what an obnoxious color." I don't know that I've changed my opinion. I do know that I've seen a lot more of them where ELCA Lutherans do their ministry.

Years ago on my first call, when the program began, our church wanted to participate. We really didn't know how or what to do. That's the curse and blessing of new programs. You don't know. You can't resort to the standard Lutheran default position of "We've always done it that way." Because we haven't done anything, which sadly is also a Lutheran default position. So you try many things. Some work well, some don't.

My first congregation opted to make it a clean-up day around the church. The property was on a very visible corner in an established east-Atlanta neighborhood. The road we were on was often bumper-to-bumper traffic Saturday mornings. We really needed a good clean-up, and in that regard it was good for the community. We got tremendous visibility in our yellow shirts and a lot of 'waves and stares' from folks stopping and staring on that busy road. That congregation never really learned to 'step out' or 'step up' its community involvement. It struggles to this day to do "God's Work. Our Hands."

In New Mexico, the congregation had never participated in GWOH before I arrived. We used it as a way to develop community involvement. Again we had a great location on a busy road; but we were invisible to the community. We had an older congregation but we found creative ways to be involved. We cleaned up a city park, picked trash up on various city properties, hosted a teacher's lunch at our nearby and very struggling public elementary school. We had a team go to retirement homes to provide ice cream sundaes for residents. We cleaned up

neighbor's yards and a few of members' unable-tomaintain yards. We were a rather odd-looking group at times. Yet we found meaningful ways to serve. GWOH was a thriving, cross-generational ministry to our very diverse and cross-cultural community. Yellow looked good in the Land of Enchantment!

God's Work Our Hands is rapidly approaching again this year. The church-wide community outreach program is running throughout the ELCA Synod. This is our third year of participation in the national event. There are other work/help days scheduled for our community in which we can participate, but this one is exclusively for Lutheran churches. Both Peace and First Lutheran churches do community programs, each a little differently.

This year will be the third year that First Lutheran has participated in this ELCA sponsored event. Each year, Evangelical Outreach has chosen different projects in the community. The first year we joined forces with the youth

group and did a two mile stretch of highway clean-up and sent a team to the Habitat "build house." Last year we had a yard clean-up team that focused on two houses in our neighborhood that were in dire need of help. Our group spent about four hours of hard labor in the two yards and the results were astounding.

This year, we have chosen to focus our attention on the Head Start School that has been in a financial crunch since 2010 when state funding was discontinued. They have a variety of projects that need to be done, both on their grounds and inside the school. The actual tasks have not yet been determined by the school, but will be forthcoming in the next couple of weeks.

Please join us for our day of service in the community that will begin with a short blessing service and continental breakfast in the fellowship hall at 8:30 a.m. on Sunday, September 10th.

This is an opportunity to celebrate - one church, freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor. As we prepare for God's Work Our Hands at FLC, service is at the forefront of our minds and hearts. Every day we are able to see that little hands can do BIG work. It is amazing to watch compassion and kindness being developed in the hears of our little ones. This can be seen as they work together to complete a project, share materials, and show concern if a friend is having a problem.

At Lamb of God, teachers often use the phrases, "let's check on our friend" or "let's see if we can help". Developing a servant's heart begins early on and it is never too soon to begin to instill

the spirit of service in children. Here are a few ways that you can help young children cultivate a spirit of service and enjoying being a help to others.

- 1. Invite children to work alongside you. This gives the opportunity for you to teach by example, have conversation as you go along, and have them see the joy of service.
- 2. Help children to notice what needs to be done. If you notice something bring it to the child's attention and continue conversation about helping. This gives the opportunity for children to see that they can see need and be helpful.



- 3. Let them enjoy helping out. There is great joy in serving others. Let children see the joy in serving and make serving fun. Helping tasks can be turned into games, completed while listening to their favorite music, or focus on a topic they are interested in.
- **4.** Cheer them on as they learn to serve. Recognize their efforts—no matter the result. Focus on the heart and intent behind the child's actions more than the end result.
- 5. Ask children what their ideas are for serving, listen to their response and TAKE ACTION! Serving together will be even more meaningful when everyone's ideas are taking into consideration and work together.

Consecration Sunday—October 8, 2017

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's stewardship committee has selected the New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay

dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During worship services on the weekend of Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of Giving Card does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge everyone to attend, even those who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one

feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader, Bishop Roger Gustafson, will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and governing board members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

First Suppers Favorite Recipe: Better Than Takeout Chicken Fried Rice

Shared by the First Suppers team

8 servings

Ingredients

- 1 pound chicken, cooked and shredded
- 3 cups cooked rice
- 2 Tbsp sesame oil
- 1 small white onion, chopped
- 1 cups frozen peas & carrots, thawed
- 2-3 Tbsp soy sauce (more or less, to taste)
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 2 Tbsp chopped green onions

Instructions

- 1. Preheat a large skillet or wok to medium heat. Pour sesame oil in the bottom. Add white onion, peas, and carrots, and stir-fry until tender.
- 2. Slide the vegetables to one side of the pan, and pour the beaten egg onto the other side. Using a spatula, scramble the eggs, Once cooked, combine the eggs with the vegetable mix.
- Add the rice and cooked chicken to the pan with the eggs and vegetables. Add soy sauce.
 Stir the mixture until heated through and combined. Top with green onions before serving.

80 Servings (a typical First Suppers meal) Ingredients

- 10 pounds chicken, cooked and shredded
- 30 cups cooked rice
- 1 1/4 cup sesame oil
- 5 large white onion, chopped
- 10 cups frozen peas & carrots, thawed
- 1 1/2 cups soy sauce (more or less, to taste)
- 20 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 1/4 cup chopped green onions

Instructions

August Council Actions For complete minutes, contact the office

- Welcomed Marilyn Kilgore to the meeting and then unanimously approved her appointment to serve until the next annual meeting for elections, replacing Sarah Nelson.
- Discussed and then approved a job description for a temporary, part time children's and youth ministry leader. The personnel support committee was directed to prepare suitable advertising and submit it to multiple places of their choice. The position is to be advertised as temporary (1 year term) and 20-30 hr/wk.
- · Thoroughly reviewed three hiring options for a permanent replacement to the current children's and youth ministry position. One option, nonrostered with specific training at BA level in youth ministry area, second option rostered as Deacon (MA, for Ministry of Word and Service), third option rostered (as MDiv for Ministry of Word and Sacrament) to hire at Assistant or Associate pastor level. It was the majority decision (8:1 of the 9 council members present) that the 3rd option is the one most likely to succeed in meeting the needs of the whole congregation.
- Reviewed and approved changes to the church vacation policies for church employees, including the Lamb of God school. More total vacation time, with accrual to begin at date of employment to simplify bookkeeping.
- It was noted that the Mutual Ministry committee of Brian Briggeman, Eric Londeen and Cliff Spaeth has met with the pastor.
