### **Pro-Life Month...**

October is Pro-Life Month. One of our Archdiocese's greatest life advocates was the late **Joseph Cardinal Bernardin**. His "Seamless Garment" teaching on life issues, from conception through natural death, wisely and artfully linked the Church's stand on all life issues.

Cardinal Bernardin died 20 years ago, on November 14, 1996. In honor of the anniversary of his death, I have invited **Professor Steven Millies**, a Political Science Professor at the University of South Carolina Aiken, to join us on Thursday Nov. 3, from 12:45-1:30 PM. Professor Millies will speak to Cardinal Joseph Bernardin Seventh and Eighth grade classes, and additionally, he will address the adults of St. Elizabeth Seton Parish, and the wider community at 7:00 PM, in our Parish Life Center. Professor Millies has just published a well received new book, *Joseph Bernardin: Seeking Common Ground*. In his presentations to us, he will share an overview of the late Cardinal's views and ideas, and a few illuminating and amusing stories about his life. Please plan to join us for an enlightening evening on the life of a good, wise, and holy man.

This award is given to Catholics for their faithfulness and dedication in ministry. Ron and Rosalee have been parishioners for over 20 years and have been active in the parish as Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers and Funeral Altar Servers. Sister Liz has been in the parish from the very beginning, and has run our parish prayer/reflection group. All three co-chaired the recent successful *To Teach Who Christ Is* Capital Campaign. Both in raising families, and in providing leadership in inner-city Catholic school, the Hicks' and Sister Pardo have lived out their faith. By accepting this honor from the Archbishop, they honor so many of our parish families as well, who like them, live good Catholic lives, dedicated to the Church, and live their faith through their vocations. ### **THE DIAPER GAP**

**The need for diaper banks is huge.**

Few people are aware of the "Diaper Gap" that exists in the United States. Needy families cannot purchase disposable diapers with most government assistance like food stamps and WIC. Diapers are classified with cigarettes, alcohol and pet food as disallowed purchases. Cloth diapers are not allowed in day care centers and most families in need do not have their own laundry facilities and commercial facilities do not allow cloth diapers to be washed in their machines.

**The consequences of diaper need is astonishing.**

America's babies are being shortchanged. With 5.9 million babies in the U.S. aged three or younger living in poor or low-income families and disposable diapers costing up to \$150 per month per baby with no government assistance. The average infant uses up to a dozen diapers a day and a toddler uses around 8. If a family cannot afford diapers, the baby may stay in a soiled diaper all day or the parent might clean out a soiled diaper and reuse it. Babies born into poor or low-income families can spend a day or longer in one diaper, leading to potential health risks.

Most childcare centers, even free & subsidized facilities, will turn away a child who arrives without a day's supply of disposable diapers. Many parents can not go to work or school if they can't leave their babies at childcare. Hence, babies live in home environments with more tension, less nurturing and possible abuse. Their chance to develop cognitive abilities and language skills normally is in jeopardy, and frankly, the uncomfortable baby will cry — a lot.

SWADDLE diaper bank fills the gap for partner agencies: Catholic Charities Southwest Cook, The COURAGE Program and Together We Cope.

# We Don't Take Her Breath For Granted

**rolled over and said,**

"I hope you're able to sleep tonight."

She responded drowsily, "I think I will... once I can catch my breath."

Fran woke up three times during the night with long coughing spells. A respiratory illness can do that.

The lung issues emerged after her fourth and final chemo treatment for breast cancer eight years ago and, as she says, she's been living with "a hose in her nose" ever

since. A 50-foot plastic cord connected to an oxygen-producing concentrator in our living room gives her access to our home, and I have learned the art of dodging the moving cord when we walk around the house.

"I want to be as active as I can for as long as I can," she announced on our way home from the hospital eight years ago. Fran is a woman of her word. "If it means that I die a few years earlier, then that's what it means."

Without trying to sound alarmist, I added, "I believe in that principle but we need to draw the line on activity somewhere. I feel you're better off if you don't do..."

Six years later, we're having that same conversation because it's not easy to make decisions about cutting back on activity, and we don't always agree.

The thing about the lungs is that they don't really get better. Once significantly damaged they don't revert to functioning like new again. The medications and breathing exercises are intended to prevent them from getting worse. And her illness is a progressively deteriorating disease. The idea is to slow down the decline.

"You know what I don't like," she says while I push her wheelchair in Kohl's looking for her new purse. "I don't like pity. I'm really grateful when people open doors and the disabled parking places are so helpful, but not pity. It makes me feel more helpless than I am."

I smiled when she said that, because Fran is definitely a fighter, always has been. She will fight for her clients (she still "sees" people in our home, helping them deal with a variety of personal and family issues). She will fight the weather to watch a grandson's soccer game. She will take vacations, give talks, attend meetings, lead support groups, follow the news, enjoy book club, play cards and games, visit people and, when possible, walk our treadmill. Her pulmonologist is amazed. I am too, frankly, but not surprised.

**It is no wonder that breath is a symbol of God, the Holy Spirit.**

It's when she can't breathe that we don't take it for granted, and we know, really know, how essential it is.



The all-pervasive, infiltrating presence of oxygen pumps life into our bodies. God indeed.

But her condition forces thoughts and talk about the future and death. As her limitations increase, "letting go" becomes more frequent, complex, real and necessary. "This is hard," she says, and I nod sadly because it is hard. For both of us.

Fran knows that letting go is a key to spiritual growth, to seeing life in its true perspective, in peeling things down to love,

service, acceptance, forgiveness and joy. "But I can't let go of my breath that's being taken away from me. I know that in some way, I must let go of something, but not my breath."

**Sometimes letting go of one thing means hanging on to something else.**

"I think I have accepted my illness but then it evolves into something else, another level that I have to accept all over again."

Fran and I love to travel but it was mighty scary when we flew the last time and she couldn't get her blood oxygen level up to normal at 30,000 feet. Do we chance flying again? How do we decide? Just another limitation to accept?

Bronchitis sneaks into our home and leads to pneumonia, which squeezes more breath out of her. Lung capacity is down to 35 percent, and she walks slower and needs to sit in our living room on her way from the bedroom to the kitchen. As I get her "puffer," the always-present rescue inhaler, she insists, "I'm OK. I just need to breathe a little." It takes more than a month to recover from the bronchitis.

The doctor advises against going out in crowds for fear of infections, but our schedule includes church on Sunday, a movie on Tuesday morning, soccer game on Wednesday, the suicide survivor support group we run on Thursday, and bridge on Saturday.

She may send her "regrets" on something scheduled, but the principle remains: "I am not going to die before I'm dead."

Only one thing is as clear as the air we breathe: We are grateful for every breath she takes.

## NEXT WEEK: PUTTING OUR GOD GLASSES ON

*No doubt we've all come to the conclusion that God sees the world and others in a very different way than we do. Can we attempt, however, to see the world with God's vision of love and mercy?*

### FIRST READING

*LORD, you love all things that exist (Wisdom 11:22 -- 12:2).*

God is always ready to forgive our sins. This passage emphasizes the grandeur of God. The "whole universe is as a grain from a balance." God is above all things. Greek philosophy taught that God was the uncreated Creator, far removed from everything that exists.

But the author then goes on to speak of how compassionate God is toward those who need His mercy. This is the opposite of Greek theology. The gods of the Greek philosophers never got involved in the everyday affairs of humans.

### SECOND READING

*May the name of Christ be glorified in you and you in Him (2 Thessalonians 1:11 — 2:2).*

The first part of the passage speaks of God's role in sanctification. We cannot hope to be faithful to God if God does not send His grace into our hearts. We are responsible to do our best to respond to that grace. It is not that God directs our choices like puppets and a puppeteer, nor are we totally independent.

We and God form a partnership. The second part speaks of the end of the world. The community is reminded that they should be careful about reports that the world is coming to an end, for there were bound to be many false predictions. This warning is as important today as it was in the early Church.

### GOSPEL

*Zacchaeus, a tax collector, considered to be a sinner, is converted to the Lord (Luke 19:1-10).*

Zacchaeus was a tax collector. Tax collectors were hated in Israel at the time of Jesus. Israel was a poor country, and the tax collectors took money that was sorely needed. They

were also considered to be collaborators of the occupying Roman army. The system of taxation led to dishonesty. A tax collector would pay up front to collect taxes in an area, and then all that he collected was considered to be his. There was no incentive to be honest. Zacchaeus was probably as dishonest as the others. He took a risk by climbing a tree to catch sight of Jesus. Jesus invites him down and tells him that he will eat with Him that very night. He proclaims that salvation had come to his house. In Luke's Gospel, we are saved the minute we meet Jesus (and not when we die), for He gives us the love that heals us from the wounds of our sins.

### REFLECTION

Do you see as God sees? Are we finding good in all that God has made? The author of Wisdom tells us that God overlooks our sins and has mercy on all to invite repentance. Do we see as God sees, finding good in all that God has made? Jesus does. He sees Zacchaeus as someone lost who can be saved. Zacchaeus climbs a tree hoping to see Jesus and Jesus invites Himself to Zacchaeus' house. Zacchaeus promises to change his ways. What does the crowd see? A sinner, unworthy of Jesus' treatment. Do we look for good as God sees or do we see only sinners, unworthy of mercy and of less value than we judge ourselves? In all honesty, I must confess that there are some people I am ready to view with God's merciful eyes, willing to look for good within them. But there are those in whom I see only sin or evil because of the harm they've done. I find it difficult to find any possibility of goodness within them. Experiences like the Holocaust, the massacres by ISIS, and the abuse of children blind us to seeing any hope for healing that God sees in all. Divine mercy does not preclude suffering consequences for one's choices. But God's vision always sees that a change of heart is possible, even where I would rather not see that. "Do we see as God sees?" Where we do, give thanks. Where we do not, climb a tree, pray that God's vision becomes ours, and hear Jesus say, "Today I must stay at your house."



### SAINT OF THE WEEK

## ST. ISAAC JOGUES, ST. JOHN DE BRÉBEUF AND COMPANIONS (1607-1646)

*These priests and companions were the first  
martyrs of the North American continent...*

As a young Jesuit, ISAAC JOGUES, a man of learning and culture, taught literature in France. He gave up that career to work among the Huron Native Americans in the New World, and in 1636, he and his companions, under the leadership of John de Brébeuf, arrived in Quebec. The Hurons were constantly warred upon by the Iroquois. In a few years, Fr. Jogues was captured by the Iroquois and imprisoned for 13 months. His letters and journals tell how he and his companions were led from village to village, beaten, tortured and forced to watch their Huron converts be mangled and killed. A chance for escape came through the Dutch, and returned to France, bearing the marks of his sufferings. Several fingers had been cut, chewed or burnt off. Pope Urban VIII gave him permission to offer Mass with his mutilated hands. He was welcomed home as a hero, but in a few months returned to his missions among the Huron Indians.

In 1646, he and Jean de Lalande, who had offered his services to the missionaries, set out for Iroquois country in the belief that a recently signed peace treaty would be observed. They were captured by a Mohawk war party, and on October 18, Fr. Jogues was tomahawked and beheaded. Jean de Lalande was killed the next day at a village that would now be near Albany, New York.

JEAN DE BRÉBEUF was a French Jesuit who came to Canada at the age of 32 and labored there for 24 years. He returned to France when the English captured Quebec (1629), expelling the Jesuits, but returned to his missions four years later. Although Huron medicine men blamed the Jesuits for a smallpox epidemic, Jean remained with them. He composed catechisms and a dictionary in Huron and saw 7,000 converted before his death. He was captured by Iroquois and died after four hours of extreme torture (in Canada).

FATHER ANTHONY DANIEL, working among Hurons who gradually became Christian, was killed by the Iroquois on July 4, 1648. His body was thrown into his chapel, which was set on fire.

GABRIEL LALEMANT had taken a fourth vow—to sacrifice his life to the Native Americans. He was horribly tortured to death.

FATHER CHARLES GARNIER was shot to death as he baptized children and catechumens during an Iroquois attack.

FATHER NOEL CHABANEL was killed before he could answer his recall to France. He had found it exceedingly hard to adapt to mission life. He struggled to learn the language, and the food and life of the Native Americans revolted him. He struggled with spiritual dryness during this time, yet he vowed to remain until death in his mission.
