## CORCORAN'S CORNER

### The Date Approaches for our "Raise the Roof" Party—June 16...

Beginning last year, the four parishes [St. Elizabeth Seton, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Julie Billiart, and St. Stephen, Deacon and Martyr] who sponsor our local parish and regional Cardinal Joseph Bernardin School, a Blue Ribbon School for Academic Excellence, made a four-year commitment to host a party/fundraiser together, to replenish funds expended for extraordinary repairs to Cardinal Bernardin School walls and windows in 2015. Last year, St. Julie Church hosted this inaugural event.

This year is our turn to host the "Raise the Roof" Party on **Friday, June 16, from 6:30-10:30 PM**, in our Parish Life Center. All four parishes are invited. Tickets are \$20 [inexpensive cash bar]. Our party features a "Hawaiian Luau Theme," complete with pig roast, chicken, salads, and dessert. Entertainment by local *Fun, Fun, Fun DJs*. Plan for a great night out. Seating is limited to 240 tickets (sold at all four parishes).

Along, with the party we will hold a four-parish raffle with only 1,000 tickets sold. The Grand Prize is \$20,000, a second prize of \$5,000, and third through twelfth prizes of \$1,000 each [prorated on us meeting our goal of 1,000 ticket sales]. Partial tickets for \$20 are available.

A waiting list to obtain party tickets and raffle tickets which are on sale, are both available at a table in the church Narthex.

### Congratulations...

We congratulate St. Elizabeth Seton Parishioners **Paul Lewis** and **Maria Merino**, for completing four years of study at the Diocese of Joliet's Biblical Institute and receiving their Advanced Biblical Studies Certificate. Their graduation will be on June 24.

### Thanks to Seniors of Seton...

The Seniors of Seton completed another year of comradeship, support, and travel. They now take a break until Tuesday, Sept. 5 (the day after Labor Day). At their recent June meeting they presented me with a check for our parish in the amount of \$2,000. Upon consultation with the parish staff, all funds contributed by parish organizations this year will go to fund the final stage of upgrading parish office computers, and new signage for our buildings. I am very grateful to the Seniors of Seton for their ongoing financial support of the mission of our parish, as well as their support of parish projects. Anytime I need help with a project I can always turn to all our parish organizations for assistance. I wish our seniors a relaxing, renewing, healthy and refreshing summer. Once again, thanks for the generous donation.

### Domestic Violence Follow-up...

We are beginning a follow-up process on the Domestic Violence talk given by **Fr. Charles Dahm** at our Masses in early April and his post-talk meeting with our parishioners. From the very beginning it was my understanding that St. Elizabeth Seton Parish would follow up on this issue by working/partnering with St. Stephen Parish. With the "Renew My Church" parish groupings created by the Archdiocese of Chicago, we are all encouraged to work with our neighboring parishes on ministry efforts in our common geographic areas. Already St. Elizabeth Seton, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Julie, and St. Stephen sponsor together our excellent Blue Ribbon for Academic Excellence, Regional Catholic Cardinal Joseph Bernardin School. St. Elizabeth Seton, St. Stephen, and St. George Parishes are forming a common R.C.I.A. Program to welcome people into the faith. St. Elizabeth Seton and St. Stephen Parish have hired a joint Teen/Young Adult/Young Family Minister, **Kyle Groves**, and St. Elizabeth Seton Parish sponsors for all area parishes the "HOPE Employment Ministry" which is a support group for those seeking work. A common parish response to follow-up on domestic abuse issues fits in with our ongoing common ministry efforts. Moreover, St. Stephen's has just had a presentation by Fr. Dahm a few months prior to our own, so they are in the first steps of their response.

After recently speaking with **Fr. Jay Finno**, the pastor of St. Stephen, we have agreed our parishes will work together on this. I know that Fr. Dahm seemed to indicate at the post talk meeting held here that we would have our own parish group, and individual parish follow-up, but this was not accurate information. We had never spoken together about this, and that was never the intention.

**Deacon Bill Schultz** of St. Stephen is coordinating the efforts on this issue at their church. He was thrilled to hear that we wanted to work with them. We also are contacting them at the right moment. Previously I announced that a meeting would take place at St. Stephen's today, Sunday June 11, at 4:00 PM, however scheduling conflicts have arisen there, **and this meeting is cancelled**. We are working on setting a new planning date for representatives from both parishes for the months ahead. The parish bulletin will inform you of future meetings.

Finally, St. Stephen's is just now building a Parish Center, (due to their huge Religious Education Program [1,400 children there vs. 309 children here], they have limited meeting space. I offered to Deacon Bill the use of our facilities for meetings. While we can never guarantee that there will be space for every date (we are only now calendaring for 2017-18), we are very open to accommodating space needs for this.

### Parish Picnic and Looking Ahead...

It has been a busy and great past year. As we close out the celebration of our Thirtieth Anniversary Year by distributing our pictorial parish directory, and host the "Roof Fest Party" on June 16, we have many new happy memories to look back on. From our once a month hospitality of donuts and coffee hosted by parish ministries and organizations, to events hosted by our parish groups including our Women's Club Pancake Breakfast and Men's Club Fish Fry, our Christmas Music Gala and Palm Sunday Cantata. We welcomed **Cardinal Cupich** as celebrant for our 30th Anniversary Mass, and dined and danced at our parish 30th Anniversary Dinner Dance at Orland Chateau. It has been a blessed and active year.

None of what we do could be accomplished without the leadership and hard work of our parish volunteers, organization leaders, and parish staff. In any social grouping there are the "worker bees" who put a lot of time and planning into executing the events. After such a full year, and conversation with others, it is seen as best to pass on the Parish Picnic this August. Just as our Parish Anniversary on Feb. 18 nixed us having a St. Patrick/St. Joseph Party in mid-March, hosting the "Raise the Roof Fest" in June has led us to take a pause on this year's Parish Picnic. Organizations and staff—people—need a bit of a break to recharge prior to the onrush of the coming year.

It is not like we are locking the doors and turning off lights. Maintenance will be in one of their busiest times getting the school in tip-top shape for the resumption of the National Blue Ribbon for Academic Excellence, Cardinal Joseph Bernardin Regional Catholic School, and our own fine Religious Education Program. Our teens will make their Mission Trip to Kentucky, our parish will be coordinating the area-wide "Theology on Tap" program for the Archdiocese, and our Religious Education Program staff will prepare for the coming academic year. Our staff will be working on promoting the R.C.I.A. Program and advance planning for the coming year. Parish organizations, boards, and councils will all be on summer break. Pacing is important in life, and sometimes it is good to take a bit of a pause, and summer is a traditional time to do so.

### Our 2017-2018 R.C.I.A. Program...

St. Elizabeth Seton, St. George, and St. Stephen Parishes will be sponsoring a combined R.C.I.A. [Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults] Program this coming year. This program is aimed at adults who are interested in converting to the Catholic Church, as well as baptized Catholics who never have received the sacraments of First Holy Communion and Confirmation. We are running a combined three parish sacramental preparation program, as part of our ongoing development of parish cooperation in the Archdiocese's "Renew My Church" program.

St. Elizabeth Seton already partners with St. Francis of Assisi, St. Julie and St. Stephen Parishes in our local Blue Ribbon for Academic Excellence, Regional Cardinal Joseph Bernardin Catholic School. And we also partner with St. Stephen Parish in a combined Youth Ministry/Young Adult Ministry Program, and in developing a joint parish response to the issue of domestic violence. The St. Elizabeth Seton Parish Hope Group for those seeking work, also is a multi-parish effort partnering with all the seven parishes in our "Renew My Church" Parish grouping [St. Elizabeth Seton, St. Francis of Assisi, St. George, St. Julie, St. Michael, Our Lady of the Woods, and St. Stephen] as well as parishes beyond our "Renew My Church" grouping.

The 2017-2018 R.C.I.A. Program will begin on Thursday, Sept. 14, 2017, at St. Stephen's Parish, and run at that site for eight consecutive weeks, moving on Thursday, Nov. 9. to St. Elizabeth Seton Parish, and running here for eight weeks, until making a final move to St. George Parish on Thursday, Jan. 18, 2018. Classes will conclude about March 15. All sessions will run on Thursday night from 7:00-8:30 P.M. Various sessions in the program focus on the sacraments, morality, catechetical teachings of our Church, etc. The sessions will be taught by priest and lay ministers of the three parishes.

We encourage our parishioners to spread the word about the program to friends, family members, and neighbors. ## A Mother Quivering With Delight

**Y**ou don't expect to see an icon of the Trinity on an airplane, at least not on a really small commuter plane at 6:30 in the morning when it is still dark outside and the temperature is near -20 degrees Fahrenheit (-30 degrees Celsius) and you are waiting on the airport runway in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. But God is a God of the unexpected, and so these things happen.

I had boarded a very tiny airplane on a particularly frigid morning, during an especially awful winter to fly to Calgary so I could board a bigger plane which would take me to Los Angeles where I was scheduled to speak at a conference that, to my good fortune, had the convention center at Disneyland as its venue. God can be good, at times.

I took my seat across the aisle from a young mother and her preschool-aged daughter. They were silent, as we all were, waiting for everyone to board the plane so we could take off.

Then, just as the captain was announcing the particulars about our flight, the mother and the daughter turned to each other and I am not sure I can describe what exactly transpired between them, but it was a mystical moment: The child looked at her mother, smiled briefly, and moved her whole body in a way that said: "We are really doing this! It's finally here! We've talked about this for a long time and now it's finally happening!" Her body literally quivered with delight.

Later, since we were on the same planes all the way to Disneyland, I learned the cause of her joy. They were off to Disneyland, she and her whole family. For her, it was a day of firsts: The first time on an airplane, the first time on a long trip, and the first time on a journey big enough to match the fantasies of a fertile young mind. She was happy and her body might well have been a musical instrument.

But it wasn't just her delight that I noticed and palpably felt. It was also the delight of her mother. If the daughter was overjoyed and basking in a special moment, even more so was the mother. Her body too quivered with delight — delight in her daughter's joy, delight in a child's anticipation, and delight in being able, as a mother, to provide this for her daughter. Her joy not only matched her child's, it surpassed it. It was deeper, far deeper. Hers was the delight of being able

to give delight, the joy of giving joy, the unique gladness of providing, of being source. To do these things is to do what God does and so to feel what God feels. That is what she must have felt.

And their exchange, that glance towards each other that made them both quiver with delight, is an icon of the Trinity, as surely as is Andrew Rublev's masterpiece ([Rublev, Trinity](#), image left). Like Rublev's icon, it too captures a little of the river of life and love and gratitude that flows between the Father and the Son and creates a fire, an energy, called the Holy Spirit. To have that flow go through you is to know God.

Like all authentic icons, it reveals something about the inner life of God. What does it reveal?

When a mother and daughter exchange a look that makes each of them quiver with delight, what is revealed is not, in the end,

something about God's gender, namely, that God is mother as well as father, female as well as male, that God also loves us with the instincts of a mother. That is true, of course, but it is not the central point.

What is centrally revealed is the heart of God, the flow of life and gratitude that makes the Father and Son quiver in each other's presence. What is revealed too, quintessentially, is how God, as creator and parent, blesses us and takes delight in us. Just as God, after creating each element in creation, stood back, beamed, and said, "This is good," and just as God looked down upon Jesus at his baptism and said: "This is my beloved child in whom I take delight," so is God still looking at us as we embark on our various fantasy journeys, so is God's heart swelling still in sharing our anticipation, and so is God quivering with delight when we receive creation's delight. God is enjoying the joy of a mother who can provide, just as God must surely suffer sometimes the pain of the mother who cannot.

**O**n a very cold morning, in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, I was shown an icon of the Trinity which has helped me to understand somewhat more those early pages of Scripture which tell us that God looked at the first Creation, young and immature though it was, and saw that it was good, indeed it was very good.


## Celebrating First Holy Communion and Confirmation

**Dear Altar Servers,**

Maybe you never thought about what it means to be an altar server, but here is something to think about...

You have served Christ at the altar, and have a connection with altar servers around the world — all attending to the mystery of the altar. Something drew you to be an altar server. Maybe it was the white robes, maybe it was a way to stay more focused at Mass. Whatever it was still resides in you even as you end your official service as an altar server. The mystery which drew you remains forever in you, whether you can articulate it or not, because it is the mystery of God that really compelled you. 

**The “Visiting Monstrance”**



# Living The Word

Reflections for  
MOST HOLY  
TRINITY  
June 18, 2017

## NEXT WEEK: GUIDING, FEEDING, DRINKING

*In the Eucharistic elements, Christ feeds us with spiritual food and quenches our thirst with the cup of salvation. Thus, He continues to guide the Church.*

### FIRST READING

*He gave you a food unknown to you and your fathers (Deuteronomy 8:2-3, 14b-16a).*

The time Israelites spent in the desert has been viewed many ways over history. On the one hand, their time in the desert was a period of difficulties and testing. There were all but unbearable circumstances in which the Israelites often lacked water, food, safety, etc. On the other hand, it was a time of God's intervention, for God protected them from every danger that oppressed them. God gave them water from a rock. God gave them manna

and quail from the skies. Because the people of Israel had no way to provide for their own needs, they learned to trust in the providence of God. Ironically, the greatest danger to Israel was not in the desert, it was when they left the desert. They could provide for themselves and they began to forget to trust. Once a year Jewish people live in tents (the Feast of the Booths) when God nourished them in the desert.

### SECOND READING

*The bread is one, and we, though many, are one body (1 Corinthians 10:16-17).*

St. Paul is able to communicate several important truths about the sacrament of the Eucharist: Eucharist is the Body and Blood of Jesus. Participating in this sacrament is union

with our Lord. Furthermore, when we eat the Body and Blood of the Lord, we are also becoming one with each other. We have to live this reality in the way we treat our neighbor.

### GOSPEL

*My flesh is true food, and My blood is true drink (John 6:51-58).*

We hear that the bread is the flesh of Jesus. The word for flesh in Greek is "sarx," and it means physical body. When the prologue of this gospel spoke about the Incarnation, it

said that the word became flesh. By using the same word for the Eucharist, it says that whatever Jesus was in the Incarnation, that is what the Eucharist is. Those listening to Him are horrified, for it sounds as if He is proposing cannibalism (this was, in fact, one of the calumnies used against early Christians). Jesus even proposes drinking His Blood (blood was sacred to the Hebrews and belonged only to God, which is why in Kosher butchering the animal is bled completely), In this holy sacrament, Jesus offers to come into a profound and intimate union with each of us.

### REFLECTION

The season of Easter ends with Pentecost Sunday. But the solemnities celebrated on the following two Sundays, the feast of the Most Holy Trinity and (in the United States) the feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, might be thought of as "echoes" that resound from our Easter celebration. The mystery of the Trinity is revealed in the events of Easter, in which we are brought by the Spirit through the cross and resurrection of Jesus into the Father's love. In Eucharist the risen Christ remains with us in the gift of His Body and Blood. The feast of Corpus Christi, as this day is commonly known, might be thought of as forming a kind of bookend with Holy Thursday. On Holy Thursday, we focus on the institution of the Eucharist in the context of Jesus' impending sacrificial death. On Corpus Christi our attention is drawn to the abiding Eucharistic presence of Christ among us, the life-giving flesh and blood through which Christ remains in us and we in Him. Many of the traditions associated with this day, including Eucharistic adoration and processions with the Blessed Sacrament, provide an opportunity to reflect on the Eucharist as the "Bread that came down from heaven," the fulfillment in Christ of the gift of manna on which the Israelites fed during their 40 years of wandering in the wilderness. Ultimately, the presence of Christ in the Eucharist is a mystery. But it is not simply the mystery of how Jesus can be with us under the appearances of bread and wine. This mystery is part of the greater mystery: the mystery of God's love for us.

*Generous God,  
how holy is this feast,  
when Christ  
becomes our food.  
By eating and  
drinking the Body  
and Blood of Christ  
and knowing Christ  
present in the Eucha-  
rist, help me to feed  
the world with your  
loving and merciful  
presence. Amen.*



### SAINT OF THE WEEK



## ST. ALBERT CHMIEOLOWSKI

1845-1916

*Saint Albert Chmielowski was a talented painter and a Secular Franciscan. In mid-life, he founded the Brothers of the Third Order of Saint Francis, Servants to the Poor, who worked with the poor and homeless. Known also as the Albertine Brothers, this community was renowned for depending completely on alms.*

BORN IN IGOLOMIA NEAR KRAKÓW AS THE ELDEST OF FOUR CHILDREN IN A WEALTHY FAMILY, HE WAS CHRISTENED ADAM. During the 1864 revolt against Czar Alexander III, Adam's wounds forced the amputation of his left leg.

His great talent for painting led to studies in Warsaw, Munich, and Paris. Adam returned to Kraków and became a Secular Franciscan.

In 1888, when he founded the Brothers of the Third Order of Saint Francis, Servants to the Poor, he took the name Albert. They worked primarily with the homeless, depending completely on alms while serving the needy regardless of age, religion, or politics. A community of Albertine sisters was established later.

Pope John Paul II beatified Albert in 1983, and canonized him six years later.

### COMMENT

Reflecting on his own priestly vocation, Pope John Paul II wrote in 1996 that Brother Albert had played a role in his formation "because I found in him a real spiritual support and example in leaving behind the world of art, literature, and the theater, and in making the radical choice of a vocation to the priesthood" (*Gift and Mystery: On the Fiftieth Anniversary of My Priestly Ordination*). As a young priest, Karol Wojtyla repaid his debt of gratitude by writing *The Brother of Our God*, a play about Brother Albert's life.

## A FINAL THOUGHT FOR YOUR WEEK

### God's Rule of Three

**I**f you ever take a class on comedy, you'll learn about a concept of which comedians regularly make use. It's called the "rule of three." An example of the rule is a comedian who pretends to be a waiter in a seafood restaurant and says, "I'd like to introduce you to today's *fresh fish* specials. We are serving salmon, halibut and *canned tuna*."

#### The principle behind the rule is simple.

First, the comedian steers the audience by influencing the listener's thoughts to flow as if they were on a set of established train tracks. The first two examples serve to "set up" the track, but then a third example intentionally derails the metaphorical train, and the resulting jolt comes as a surprise and (hopefully) is something at which we will chuckle. It is the thrill of "the expected meeting the unexpected" that brings such delight.

#### Today is the church's celebration of the "rule of three" — the dogma of the Holy Trinity.

It is so important to within our faith tradition that the Trinity is our acclamation whenever we begin or end anything we do. From our baptism to our daily prayers to our final farewell at a funeral, we do these things "In the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit."

#### Where in these relatively short readings do we see God named as "the Trinity?"

In the first reading, we hear that God appears to Moses with all of the clarity of a cloud. In the Gospel John tells us how God loves the world with such enthusiasm that he sent the Son to redeem us. Paul comes a little nearer to revealing to us God's Trinitarian nature when he voices the greeting that regularly intones the beginning of Mass. Paul writes, "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the

*Enable me to reveal this mystery  
to others by my compassionate love.

fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with all of you."

But why doesn't God just come out and say "Hey? Believe in me! I'm the Trinity!" Why not use Moses, or the writers John or Paul to tell us, "Look, I'm really one God, but you'll experience me in three different personas which will be like a Father at some points, a Son at others and then another concept all together which is like a 'spirit' but you should know that this 'spirit' will exceed any temporal dimension and will be with you forever. So just trust in any of these three phenomena because really, it's just me and I'm just One."

#### The mystery of the Trinity is vast, rich, deep and wondrous.

Saints, poets and artists have exhausted countless efforts to explain and illustrate this mystery. Each

attempt to describe this fundamental tenet within our faith both inches us closer to understanding the nature of God while at the same time pushes our understanding farther away.

**The Trinity is something to ponder more fully,  
in the same way we learn to deeply value a  
good movie, a good book or a good friendship.  
The more we explore it, the more we value it.**

**J**ust like a comedian's finely tuned set-up to a joke, there are some things we know certainly about God. God is absolute and dependable. God is the expected constant. We can ground ourselves in God. And just like a comedian's unforeseen wrinkle, God is also the unexpected, the surprising, and the ever-new. We can rest assured in knowing that God is One, but we should also be astounded by the unexpected twist in knowing that God's oneness is three. This mystery is God's delight and with a smile, we are invited to enter into his ever-unfolding revelation as we do everything in God's "rule of three."
